Dear Parents and Carers,

This week seems to have zoomed by and feels a bit of a blur. We have been extremely busy rehearsing for our harvest festival and engaging in lots of outdoor learning looking at how autumn affects the trees and other plants. As we move fully into the season of autumn, we have been reflecting on Harvest and the true meaning of this time. Harvest festivals are believed to date back to ancient Britain. Lots of different religions celebrate a similar form of festival, as it was a time where people would have the most food from the plants they grew.

Farmers gave thanks for a good harvest during the full moon closest to the autumn equinox, it was important to them because it meant they could store the food and eat well through the hard winter months.

Here at St Peter's we have been thinking about the Christian Festival of Harvest as well as Harvest around the world. On Wednesday the children were treated to a wonderful morning when they went into Strawson's Field to see two types of tractors that are used on the 200 fields around this area. Alistair and Claire Roberts, Sally Nicholls (Adeline's mummy) and Zoe, who have the two nearest farms to us very kindly came along with not only tractors but buckets of wheat, maize, corn and beans to show the children. The children were shown a tractor with a seed drill and 'Colin the Fifth'. The enthusiasm for this was delightful to see and the children asked really interesting questions. Later in the afternoon the whole school was treated to a 'Harvest Live' event put on by the National Farmers Union, with over 180,000 pupils joining the live stream. As part of this, the children were invited to cook a special recipe of Palak Paneer and see where all the ingredients had come from. The Busy Bees participated in this part, all joining in to prepare the ingredients before having a great tasting session. I have to say they were amazing, and it smelled and tasted delicious! Well done Busy Bees.

Following this we had our beautiful Harvest Festival at St Peter's Church today. It was wonderful to see so many parents and carers attend church with us. The children were absolutely brilliant. Although we can prepare for this, you can never quite predict what will happen, especially for our youngest members of school, many of whom have not been to St Peter's Church before. We couldn't have asked for a better service with them.



BUSY BEES

This week our Busy Bees have been extremely busy!!! We have learned new sounds during our phonics sessions, how to write those sounds and how to apply them to read new words. In Maths we have been mastering number 5, learning to count to 5 using the counting principles developed during the last few weeks and represented numbers up to 5 in concrete and pictorial ways as well as linking an amount to the numerals 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. We have also celebrated Harvest in a very special way; some local farmers came and visited us with their tractors in the morning and we have learned so much about farming and the life of a farmer. Collective worship took place on the field with a very special prayer related to Harvest from Reverend Ashton. In the afternoon we joined online with thousands of other schools in England for a session of Harvest LIVE where we cooked a special Indian food called Palak Panner. All the Busy Bees helped, and they all ate their share of this amazing food



LADYBIRDS

Ladybirds have really enjoyed this week. We have been working hard for our church service, practising all the songs. We really hope you enjoyed it. We thoroughly enjoyed our collective worship on Strawson's Field on Wednesday, seeing the amazing tractors. In English we continued looking at '*Lila and the Secret of Rain*', thinking about using adjectives to describe a setting and a character. In Maths we have been learning about 2D shapes and whether they have lines of symmetry or not. In History we have continued to learn about Ruby Bridges. We created fact files about her life and her achievements for Black Civil Rights in America.



DRAGONFLIES

Dragonflies have had a very scientific week! We have focused our science by creating healthy, unhealthy and balanced meals. We investigated the properties of foods to find out which contains protein, carbohydrates etc. We used this as a base for our first proper experiment in Year 2-we are investigating what different drinks do to our teeth. We are using eggs to represent our teeth and testing the effects of coke, juice and water on the 'enamel' (shell) over time. We will share our results with you next week. In English this week we have been using imperative verbs to help Paddington navigate life in London. In Maths we have been looking at 'greater than' and 'less than' a number and how to show this mathematically.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

A multiplayer 'social deduction' game set in outer space, Among Us enjoyed a surge in popularity in 2020, and has since maintained a dedicated fan-base (globally, around 60 million regular players each month) thanks to its unique nature, simple premise and ease of access across numerous platforms. The game's on-screen

action revolves around danger, disguise and deception – and there are certain parallels to be drawn with some of the real-life risks that parents and carers of young Among Us players need to be aware of.

AMONG US, AMONG FRIENDS

When your child and their friends get together, they can enjoy a private game of Among Us by choosing a 'local' lobby – that is, only people connected to the same WiFi (your home network, for example) can enter. This prevents any random online users – who may be total strangers – from joining and removes the need for voice chat, as the players are all physically in the same location.

CHAT ABOUT CHATTING

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You might feel it's prudent to talk to your child about the risks associated with voice chat while gaming, explaining in particular that strangers online aren't always who they claim to be. Keeping the conversation relaxed will reinforce your child's confidence that they can always come to you with any online concerns - not just about Among Us, but any potential future issues as well.

DISCUSS DISCORD

In general, Discord is an excellent app for keeping anline communities together because of its use of dedicated individual servers, which allow comprehensive control over who can join – and w can't. STOP SURPRISE SPENDING

If you're concerned about the possibility of your child racking up an unexpected bill on Among Us' microtransactions, you could consider using a prepaid card with a set limit. Likewise, you could specify in the game's options that adult authorisation is required for every purchase – or you could make sure that no payment methods are enabled on the device that your child plays the game on.
