FLU VACCINES

The School Nurse Immunisation Team will be at St Peter's on Tuesday 26 November to administer the Flu Vaccination (Nasal Spray) to all year groups YR-Y2. Please ensure that you complete and submit your child's consent form promptly (and before 12pm on 20th November 2024), whether you wish your child to be immunised or not. Parents who have not submitted their consent form by the deadline and wish their child to be immunised will need to call the immunisation team to book an appointment at a community catch up clinic. If you do not wish your child to receive the vaccine please indicate this on the online form—details in the email sent 12/9/24.

BUSY BEES



This week Busy Bees have started to learn the first sounds that will enable them to start reading and writing short words...this is really exciting!!! They have been amazing and showed a great attitude for learning during the phonics sessions. We learned the sounds 's', 'a', 't', and 'p' and practiced them in our books using cursive handwriting. We have also started to focus on numbers to 5 during our maths sessions—thinking of different ways to make those numbers and the composition of each one of them.

An important aspect of children's personal, social, and emotional development (PSED) is to "learn how to make good friendships, co-operate and resolve conflicts peaceably". These past few weeks in Busy Bees there has been a great focus on this area. PSED builds foundations for making relationships throughout life and the adults in the classroom have been supporting the children, so they can develop the social conventions of being kind to each other, sharing, and playing 'nicely' together.






LADYBIRDS

Ladybirds have had another brilliant week. We have continued our sentence writing practise, using the story 'The Town Mouse and the Country Mouse' to inspire us. We focused on writing full sentences using punctuation in the form of capital letters to start a sentence and full stops to end and using finger spaces between words so that our writing is easier to read. We also thought carefully about words we could use to describe the country mouse and the environment in which he lived. In Maths we have been focusing on ordering numbers to 20 and practising some addition, using a number line to help us. During our outdoor learning session, we looked for signs of autumn and completed a check list to keep track of what we had found. We also created some animals made from clay and are really looking forward to painting these next week.

DRAGONFLIES

Dragonflies have had a really productive week. We have started looking at the book 'Katie in London' by James Mayhew for English. We have started to write our own versions of the story, changing the characters and improving on the book by thinking of alternative words we might use to add better description. In Maths we have learned about estimating. We estimated totals and learned how this skill can be useful. We then moved onto looking at doubling using partitioning. We will continue this next week. In History, we have continued investigating 'The Great Fire of London'. The children were given sentence starters and had to continue the writing about the fire applying their historical knowledge to do this. In Art we have used monochrome colours to draw the London skyline. The children have produced some really amazing work.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? The video game Final Fantasy XIV launched in 2010, and, despite being critically panned, it saw an overhaul that has made it one of the biggest success stories in gaming. Its huge world, epic story and versatile combat system have continued to draw in new players, but there's a lot that trusted adults need to be aware of - not least the cost of paying monthly to play.



ALWAYS ONLINE

REGULAR EXPANSIONS

As with similar titles in the genre, players can purchase expansions to unlock addition content for the game. Those without the expansions will be locked out of certain new quests and activities, meaning that young people who play regularly will potentially he the next release earmarked on their calendary.

IN-GAME PURCHASES & SUBSCRIPTION FEE

Users need to pay £8.99 per month to play Final Fantasy XIV, but there is a free trial. If someone stops paying, they'll lose access to their character (although they'll be able to pick up the payments again and resume where they left off). If a player forgets to cancel their payments, however, those subscription fees will continue rolling on automatically.

VOICE & TEXT CHAT

Final Fantasy XIV lets players send chat messages in-game or speak to each other over voice chat. On the one hand, that provides plenty of choice for how those enjoying the game can interact with their fellow fans. On the other hand, however, it's easier than in many games to receive unprompted messages from a stranger, with whom you constantly share your play space.

VIOLENCE

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

As with World of Warcraft, there's an element of addiction to Final Fantasy XIV. The gameplay loop can be quite engrossing, as minutes turn into hours and hours into days while playing alone or with friends. This can potentially lead to missing read-life events, a lack of interest in any activities not related to the game and procrastination around responsibilities like
