#### **CLASS NEWS**

#### **BUSY BEES**

This week Busy Bees based a lot of their learning on two books: "Once There Were Giants" by Martin Waddell and "The Great Big Book of Families" by Mary Hoffman. The children have been talking about their own families and we have realised how special and unique each family is. They also drew a picture of their families and displayed them inside a 'house' frame. In preparation for our Harvest Service next week, we have made a very special craft to show our families at church. In Maths we are working on numbers to 5 and exploring which numbers can be put together to make 5.

During the weekend if you are out and about, please encourage your child to collect 'Autumn' items such as leaves, conkers, etc and bring them to school next week so that we can enjoy some lovely Autumn crafts and create an interactive Autumn display/sensory tray. Thank you.

#### LADYBIRDS

Ladybirds have continued mastering addition in Maths this week as well as focussing on numbers to 20. We are becoming much more confident with using a number line to help us with our understanding and thinking processes. In English, we have used the book *"Lila and the Secret of the Rain"* by David Conway to inspire our writing. We learned about adjectives and how we can use them in our writing to make it more interesting for the reader. Using this knowledge we then went on to write some fantastic sentences using adjectives. In History we have been learning about the life of Ruby Bridges and thought about questions we would like to ask her.

Dragonflies have researched London during Tudor times this week. We looked at the features of Tudor houses and buildings which were found at this time and then designed and constructed historically accurate house models of our own. They are looking amazing! In Maths we have looked at partitioning and investigating what numbers are actually worth. The children represented this in a pictorial fashion and then converted it to number sentence form. # What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

Instagram is a highly popular social media platform with over 2 billion active monthly users. The app is continuously updating and adding new features to meet the wishes of its audience, allowing them to upload images and videos to their Instagram feed, create interactive 'stories', go live, exchange private messages or explore and follow other accounts that catch their eye.

#### ADDICTION

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WHAT ARE

THE RISKS?

Many social media platforms, Instagram included, are designed to keep us engaged on them for as long as possible. They encourage scrolling often and scrolling more in case we miss something important – in essence, a fear of missing out. On Instagram, young people can lose track of time when aimlessly scrolling and watching videos posted by friends, acquaintances, influencers and possibly strangers.

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#### UNREALISTIC IDEALS

Children sometimes compare themselves to what they see online: how they look, how they dress, and the way their life is going in comparison to others on social media. However, most people only share the positives about their lives online and many use filters when sharing pictures of themselves. A constant comparison with unrealistic ideals can lead to insecurity over one's own appearance and lifestyle. 29 P 29

#### GOING LIVE

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Livestreaming on Instagram allows users to connect with friends and followers in real time. Risks increase if the account is public, because that means anyone can watch the broadcast, which could result in further contact from strangers. Additional dangers of going live include an impulse to act inappropriately to draw more viewers, as well as being exposed to harmful content or offensive language.

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#### INFLUENCER CULTURE

Social media influencers are sometimes paid thousands of pounds to promote products, services, apps and more. When celebrities or influencers post such content, it often says 'poid partnership' above the post. In April 2024, Ofcom found that over a quarter of children (27%) believed in influencer marketing, accepting their endorsement of products wholeheartedly. So it's perfectly possible for young people to be taken in by this kind of content.

OF RESTRICTION

#### PRODUCT TAGGING

Product tags allow users to tag a product or business in their post. This tag will take viewers directly to the product detail page on the shop where the item can be purchased. Children may also be encouraged by influencers to purchase products that they advertise.

#### **EXCLUSION & OSTRACISM**

Youngsters are highly sensitive to feeling excluded, which comes in many forms: not receiving as many flikes' as expected; not being tagged in a friend's photo; being unfriended; not receiving a comment on their post or a reply to a message they sent. Being excluded online hurts just as much as offline. Young people have reported lower moods and self-esteem when excluded in this way, feeling as if they don't belong and aren't valued.

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### Advice for Parents & Educators

#### AVOID GOING PUBLIC

If a young user wants to share their clothing style, make up or similar and use product tagging to show off the items in their post, they may be tempted to change their settings to public. This leaves their profile visible to everyone, which carries the risk of strangers getting in touch with them. Set a child's account to private and explain the importance of keeping it this way.

#### **USE MODERATORS**

Instagram Live has implemented a mechanic calle Moderators', meaning that creators can assign a moderator and give them the power to report comments, remove viewers and remove the ability for certain viewers to comment at all. Consider this if a child in your care wants to go live on the platform. It's also recommended to keen reviewers and remomunal spaces so recommended to keep devices in communal spaces so you're aware if a child does go live or watch a livestrear

#### HAVE AN OPEN DIALOGUE

Talk to children about the positives and negatives of social media, including the risks involved and how they can view or create content safely with family and friends. Explain how safety settings will ensure only followers can view them, and why this is so important. Also, if you find a child continuously uses filters on theil back ack them why not imprese on hom that they photos, us. don't need it.

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#### FOLLOW INFLUENCERS

Following influencers will allow you to monitor what they're sharing as well as being able to discuss anything which you deem inappropriate. Talk to children about who they follow and help them to develop critical thinking skills about what the influencer is trying to do. For example, encourage the child to ask themselves if an influencer is trying to sell them a product when they make a video endorsing it.

Chi Due to the potential impact on mental wellbeing, Instagram allows users to hide the total likes on their posts, to prevent people from obsessing over that number in the corner. Users can hide like counts on all the posts in their feed as well as on their own posts. This means others can't see how many likes a person gets. This can be done by going into Settings > Notifications > Posts > Likes > Off.

#### BALANCE YOUR TIME

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MANAGE LIKE COUNTS

Instagram has a built-in activity dashboard that lets you control how much time is spent on the opp. Make sure children sign in to the platform with the correct age, as Instagram's Teen Accounts' afford much more control for parents and carers over how long they can use the app each day. Talk with young users about how much time they spend on Instagram and work together to set a healthy time limit.
